And the House having met,

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor then entered the House and, being seated on the Throne, was pleased to open the Session by the following gracious speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

On behalf of our Sovereign, I welcome you to the opening of the Fourth Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario.

As Honourable Members were reminded earlier today, continued improvement in the prosperity of our Province was slowed to some extent last year by inflation. In 1974, the economy of Ontario, as with most of the major economies of the world, is faced with the uncertainties of the real and potential impact of the energy situation. In my Government's view, however, the prospects appear more favourable here than elsewhere. Despite projections of slower economic growth this year, combined with the continued rapid growth of the Province's labour force, it is still hoped that the level of employment achieved in 1973, which produced a record of 149,000 new jobs, will be maintained.

While my Government will employ all practical means at its disposal to alleviate the causes and effects of inflation, nevertheless it bears repeating that the problem can only be dealt with in a national context, with all governments cooperating.

In recognition of the fact that science, research and innovation play such an important role in an advanced and diversified economy, the Government of Ontario will establish structures to develop and coordinate science policy, both within our Province and in cooperation with the Government of Canada and other Provinces. Strong emphasis will be placed on the practical application of science to maintain our leadership in high technology industry. This is a key component in my Government's efforts to preserve our national economic independence, and to ensure that maximum social benefits are achieved.

A comprehensive program to improve essential services in remote areas of the Province will be introduced. This will include an extension of the electrification process, and improved telecommunications, especially for emergency purposes.

Improvements in telephone and communications systems in remote areas will benefit the residents and provide a firmer base for economic development. The cooperation of the Federal Government and of industry will be sought to develop reliable communications systems for the North.

A feasibility and engineering study will be undertaken for a road link to James Bay through Moosonee. This will include an environmental impact study and full public hearings.

Priority consideration will be given to the supply of electric power to Northern communities. A power line to Moosonee will be the first project in this undertaking.

Northern communities in unorganized territories will, through enabling legislation, have the opportunity to establish local community councils. Fire protection, water, roads, and other such services will become the responsibility of these community councils. Implementation of this plan will follow full consultation with residents of communities that wish to participate.

In recognition of the fact that the North, with its great distances, requires a first-rate highway system, high priority has been given to rebuilding and widening Highway 17 between Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury.

Following the success of NorOntair, four more communities in North-western Ontario will receive air services in the first phase of an expansion program. In addition, funds will be made available for improvements to certain existing airports to bring them up to the standard required for a regular scheduled air service.

The Ontario Government is negotiating an Agreement to participate, through an appropriate agency, in the Polar Gas project to bring natural gas from the Arctic islands to Ontario.

Studies will be made regarding the establishment of a port facility in the James Bay area to bring potential supplies of gas, oil and minerals from sources in the Eastern Arctic.

The proposals for energy management announced last June indicated my Government's long-term goals for the continued social, industrial and economic progress of this Province. Developments in the Middle East in recent months have further underlined the pressing need for a coordinated energy policy for Canada, which the Ontario Government has been urging.

My Government will shortly outline Ontario's policy on the control and development of uranium as a provincial and national resource.

A General Development Agreement between the Federal Government and the Ontario Government has been signed. The Agreement has a duration of ten years and is intended to improve opportunities in those areas of Ontario which are in need of special assistance and to realize greater development potential.

The community of Cornwall is the first to benefit from this Agreement, and joint expenditures of approximately \$14 million will be provided for such projects as the completion of servicing for an industrial park, construction of a Civic Centre, and the development of a tourist and recreational area.

Tourist operations, small businesses and service industries will benefit from improved loan programs and financial assistance from the three Provincial Development Corporations. Operators of small business establishments will receive more help and advice in solving management problems.

The Ontario Council for the Arts will undertake a program through which practising artists in the creative and performing arts may work in and with local communities. Emphasis will be placed on visits to schools in remote areas, and on programs in public libraries.

A wide variety of extension programs will be offered at Provincial cultural facilities. The Art Gallery of Ontario will establish an internship program to prepare fine arts students for art gallery careers, as well as programs to promote the visual arts throughout the Province.

In response to the recommendations of the Commission on Post-Secondary Education, my Government proposes to expand academic and cultural opportunities in the open sector. This will include the extension of educational broadcast services within the Province, along with the development of new and

innovative educational support materials for school and college students as well as for persons learning at home.

You will be asked to consider legislation concerning negotiations between the teaching profession and school boards, as well as proposals for the consolidation of all legislation respecting elementary and secondary education.

In keeping with my Government's determination to introduce programs on a selective basis to meet those areas of greatest need, an income support program will be proposed which will assist in achieving a greater measure of security for Ontario's older citizens and for the disabled.

A proposal will be made for a prescription drug plan for our senior citizens.

Ontario's younger children are presently served by kindergartens, day care services of approved agencies and special programs for the handicapped. My Government will continue to support these services, and will initiate a new program of assistance for cooperative day care centres in low-income areas. The use of school and other community facilities for child care will be encouraged, and accommodation and staffing regulations will be reviewed with the aim of removing unnecessary impediments to the creation of new services. Resources will be made available to expand high priority services such as those for handicapped children, children from low-income families and native children.

Rehabilitation services will be strengthened to provide assistance to a larger number of physically and mentally disabled persons. Special efforts will be made to encourage local initiatives for community-based mental retardation services, including new community residences.

Amendments to The Health Insurance Act will provide a formal review mechanism for claims for services by non-medical practitioners, paralleling the system now used for claims by physicians.

The Report of the Health Planning Task Force, which has been chaired by Dr. Fraser Mustard, has been received by my Government. During the course of this Session, proposals will be placed before you for further development of a comprehensive health plan for the people of Ontario.

My Government will present proposals for extensive new sports, fitness and recreational programs that will offer more opportunities for the improved health and enjoyment of the people of Ontario.

A health education program will be prepared providing information on such health hazards as alcohol, tobacco and other drugs, and to encourage better use of our public health care system.

You will be asked to approve a major educational and enforcement program designed to reduce the highway accident toll caused by impaired drivers.

With regard to the Ontario Law Reform Commission's Report on Administration of the Courts, my Government will proceed with a planned program of implementation for judicial areas and for the rotation of judges and trial centres throughout those areas in consultation with those affected.

My Government is reviewing legislative and Common Law rules affecting the family as an institution in such matters as occupational and property rights in the home and laws concerning children.

A legislative program will be introduced ensuring that family law in Ontario reflects today's social and economic realities. The ultimate objective is a Code of Family Law, with special attention to the status of women and for the provision of a legal framework that will strengthen the family unit in our society. Attention will also be given to clarifying the legal rights of married persons.

My Government will create a new Office for Women Crown Employees in order to improve personnel administration and hiring practices.

My Government intends to promote the development of small community-based adult residences in place of traditional correctional institutions. These centres will be used in the rehabilitation of selected offenders prior to their release and as residences for those who are working or studying under the Temporary Absence Program. In Northern areas of the Province, centres will be located closer to existing communities with potential employment opportunities.

A new system will be introduced to place juveniles in training schools closer to their own homes and to provide better integration of group homes, probation, after-care and institutional services.

Negotiations are under way for operation and supervision by private business of an industrial enterprise within a correctional centre. This innovative experiment should provide inmates realistic employment and training experience. The labour force would consist of those serving short terms under minimum custody, who would be paid competitive wages. My Government is confident that with the support and cooperation of labour unions and industry, the concept can play a worthwhile part in correctional services in the years ahead.

My Government will introduce legislation with regard to consumer product warranties and guarantees in order to provide better protection for consumers, new redress procedures and more flexible means of administration. Legislation will also be introduced to protect the consumer from unfair and unacceptable trade and business practices.

Honourable Members, you will be asked to consider provisions for the mandatory use of automobile seat belts.

Legislation will be presented to establish an inter-regional public transportation authority for the Toronto area. My Government believes this legislation will maintain regional autonomy and provide a model that may be adapted to other areas of the Province.

You will be asked to approve legislation which will require an environmental assessment of major new development projects.

A permanent Advisory Committee on Solid Waste Management will be established in order to achieve closer consultation with municipal governments, environmental groups and industry, whose cooperation is essential to the

solution of problems created by increasing waste of energy and material resources and the difficulties of waste disposal.

My Government will also propose other measures for the control and reduction of litter and solid waste.

My Government believes that positive steps must be taken to conserve and improve our visual environment. To this end, your views will be sought with respect to placing limitations and controls on outdoor advertising.

For the second consecutive year, dwelling starts in Ontario have exceeded 100,000 units, a rate of construction which is consistent with the Government's overall objective of one million new dwelling units in 10 years.

To assist in this achievement, a wide range of programs and approaches in housing development and community planning will be proposed, including housing for lower-income earners. These programs will be implemented within the legislative framework of a revised Planning Act, amendments to The Condominium Act and the establishment of a new Building Code for Ontario, and will be characterized by a closer partnership with other levels of Government, the private sector and citizens' groups.

It is proposed to increase spending on the construction of sewage and water treatment facilities from \$81 million in 1973 to \$115 million this year. The funds will be used for anti-pollution control and high quality water supply programs and servicing needs for new home construction.

In cases where land is designated by the Government for necessary housing or is being held by the private sector for future development, the Government will make proposals to ensure continued agricultural production on all suitable lands until they may be required for other purposes.

Twenty-three communities have been designated as neighbourhood improvement areas eligible for Federal/Provincial assistance for planning and improving physical and social facilities. My Government will urge the Government of Canada to extend assistance for commercial and industrial renewal.

The private sector, in consultation with local and regional governments will be encouraged to increase the supply of serviced lots and to work towards stabilization of land and housing prices. The Government looks to the private sector for even greater cooperation than in the past in the construction of public housing, involvement with rent supplement and integrated community housing programs, the Preferred Lending Program and condominium building, so that the housing needs of a large segment of the population can be met within a moderate price range.

A Provincial Home Renewal Program will be introduced with grants to homeowners and municipalities for preserving and upgrading the quality of existing housing in rural as well as urban areas.

This autumn, the Premier of Ontario will be host to the annual conference of Provincial Premiers. This comes at a particularly important time in our history when challenges facing us within Canada and problems of world-wide significance will require a new level of interprovincial cooperation and understanding to strengthen our nation and to maintain and enhance our sense of national purpose.

May Divine Providence guide you in these tasks and in the discharge of your responsibilities.

Honourable Members, I wish to take the opportunity on this occasion to state that it has been my pleasure and privilege to have performed this duty over the past five years. To my successor, one of Ontario's most renowned and distinguished citizens, may I express all good wishes for her forthcoming term of office.

INFLATION AND THE COST OF LIVING

- 1. Failure to investigate increases in profit to ensure no excess profit taking;
- 2. Failure to establish a price and profit review Tribunal with power to investigate every aspect of price increases, and take whatever action is necessary to ensure no unreasonable increases or to have selected increases rolled back;
- 3. Failure to establish a consumer protection code extending not only to market place transactions in commodities but to the provision of services;
- 4. Failure to institute a province-wide warranty for home building standards;
- 5. Failure to institute a public automobile insurance program.

NORTHERN DEVELOPMENT

- 1. Failure to establish economic growth in Northern Ontario based on the resource potential as a catalyst for secondary development;
- 2. Failure to establish northern economic development and employment based on long term secondary growth as a number one priority;
- 3. Failure to recognise the massive economic disparity between Northern and Southern Ontario and the adverse effects of the two-price system in this province, and failure to take appropriate measures to bring about equality.

LAND USE AND URBAN GROWTH

- 1. Failure to move immediately to acquire for the public sector sufficient land to meet the projected housing needs over the next twenty years.
- 2. Failure to begin a house building program aimed at producing at least 250,000 homes both private and public within 18 months;
- 3. Failure to develop a land use policy and overall development plan to meet recreation requirements in all areas of the province with immediate emphasis on the Golden Horseshoe area;
- 4. Failure to establish rent review and control measures.

EMPLOYER-EMPLOYEE RELATIONS

- 1. Failure to amend the Labour Relations Act to meet the legitimate request of the Ontario Federation of Labour as conveyed to all Members of the Legislature;
- 2. by allowing conditions of work and wages for the hospital workers of Ontario to deteriorate to a sub-standard level;
- 3. by creating a confrontation with teachers in this province and then failing to respond to the consequences of this action;
- 4. by inflicting compulsory arbitration on Crown Employees;
- 5. Failure to legislate against strike-breaking and the use of firms and individuals to disrupt orderly, legal strikes.

INCOME MAINTENANCE

- 1. by failing to institute an income maintenance program to meet the legitimate needs of the elderly;
- 2. by failing to establish adequate income levels for the disabled and other disadvantaged people in Ontario.

HEALTH

- 1. Failure to provide a sufficient range of institutional facilities to ensure adequate health care at lowest cost;
- 2. by failing to institute a dental and drug care program;
- 3. by failing to take initiatives which would upgrade the value of preventive medicine.

And Further, that the government shows gross negligence in its refusal to tax the resources industry of Ontario, at a level which would allow

individuals and families in this Province to experience major relief from the inequitable and oppressive system of taxation presently in effect.

On motion by Mr. Wardle,

Referring to the alleged matter of privilege raised earlier in the week, by the Members for Scarborough West and Ottawa Centre, I must again point out, as I have on several other occasions, that by Standing Order 27 (i) a Minister may, in his discretion, decline to answer any question. I know of no recognized privilege of Parliament that would supersede that provision; nor can Members demand, as a matter of privilege, the Tabling by a Minister of documents which they may consider important. The Standing Orders provide procedures for Members who are not satisfied with answers to questions, and for notices of motion for the production of documents. In the latter case I should point out, however, that the mere Tabling of a notice of motion for the production of papers does not compel their production. The motion must be passed by the House and become an Order of the House before it becomes obligatory on a Minister to comply therewith. I suggest that this latter fact re-emphasizes what I said at the outset, that is, that the refusal of a Minister to comply with an oral demand in the Question Period for the production of documents is not a matter of privilege.

On Thursday two matters were raised with me by the Members for Scarborough West and Wentworth. I have looked into these questions and my findings are as follows:—

Firstly, the point made by the Member for Scarborough West with respect to the reference of Boards and Commissions is valid up to a point. It is perfectly true that on Wednesday, March 6th, when the Standing Committees for this Session were authorized by Order of the House, it was ordered that "all Boards and Commissions are hereby referred to Committees numbers 1 to 4 in accordance with the policy areas indicated by the titles of the said Committees". Therefore, all Boards and Commissions coming within the Resources Development policy field stand referred to the Resources Development Committee. However, before any such

Board or Commission can be called before the Committee, there must be a decision by the Committee, at least by a majority, that the Committee wishes to hear that Board or Commission. Moreover, should the Committee decide to call the Workmen's Compensation Board, any discussion of the silicosis problem would have to be confined to matters within the jurisdiction of that Board. The scheduling of meetings of any Standing Committee is the responsibility of the Chairman. The Vice-Chairman, who is at present acting as Chairman, takes the position that as the Board comes under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Labour, the Estimates of which have not yet been considered by the Committee, there will be ample opportunity to question the Board at that time, and as the Committee has already taken up a great deal of time, this inquiry should be conducted in that way.

Referring now to the point raised by the Member for Wentworth, as I said previously, Wednesdays are sessional days, even when reserved for Committees. Non-sessional days during the Session are, of course, Saturdays and Sundays, public holidays, and any day on which the House is actually adjourned and recessed for such things as funerals, etc. A sessional day reserved by Order of the House for the Committees thereof is none the less a sessional day. Mr. Speaker then said:-

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

We, Her Majesty's most dutiful and faithful subjects, the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, in Session assembled, approach Your Honour with sentiments of unfeigned devotion and loyalty to Her Majesty's person and Government, and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled, "An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money for the Public Service for the fiscal year ending the 31st day of March, 1975."

To this Act the Royal Assent was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:—

"The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor doth thank Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, accept their benevolence and assent to this Bill in Her Majesty's name."

The Honourable the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to deliver the following gracious speech:—

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

Before bringing this Fourth Session of the Twenty-ninth Parliament of Ontario to an end, it is my pleasure to present a review of some of the achievements of this Assembly in the past year.

As Honourable Members are aware, the major concern in 1974, for Ontario as elsewhere, was continuing inflation. Consumer prices last year rose by an average of 10.5 per cent. Yet, Canada and Ontario again experienced lower inflation rates than those evident in other industrialized countries.

Ontario's unemployment rate averaged approximately 4.1 per cent, slightly above the 1973 level. However, favourable circumstances have prevailed, as a result of which the Province was generally able to provide employment for persons entering the steadily increasing labour force, and about 152,000 new jobs were created during the year.

At the same time, to help control the growth rate of Provincial Expenditures, my Government announced its intention of holding the number of positions in the Ontario Civil Service throughout 1975 to the April 1st, 1974 level. This step is taken in the belief that the existing approved complement of 71,705 employees, excluding members of the Ontario Provincial Police, will allow sufficient flexibility within the operations of Government while ensuring that the level of service to the people of Ontario will not be adversely affected.

Several initiatives announced in the Budget last spring were directed toward offsetting the impact of rising costs on Ontario's citizens, and especially so for persons on fixed incomes.

As initially introduced on July 1st, Ontario's Guaranteed Annual Income System for the elderly, disabled and blind, known as GAINS, established a program of monthly payments to eligible persons to ensure a minimum annual income of \$2,600 for single people and \$5,200 for couples. A subsequent increase in Federal Old Age Security and Pension Support, in response to higher living costs, was supplemented by the Ontario Government which raised the GAINS minimum income to \$2,700 and \$5,400 respectively, on October 1st.

In a further increase effective January 1st, 1975, the GAINS guarantees moved to \$2,766 for single people and \$5,532 per couple. This second increase brings an additional 2,00 people into the program and raises the total payments by the Province to \$84.5 million in the current fiscal year.

A new Drug Benefit plan was introduced on September 1st, extending further the benefits of the Province's health system to allow over half a million residents to receive prescribed drugs without charge. All persons who receive the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement, or Ontario GAINS or Family Benefits support are automatically eligible under the plan.

Universally applied benefits announced in the 1974 Budget include retail sales tax exemptions covering a wide range of consumer products, and amounting to an extimated reduction in potential revenues of \$43 million. Further enriched Ontario tax credits, including the property tax credit, estimated to cost \$70 million, were supplemented by an additional grant of \$124 million to Municipal Governments to keep local property tax increases to a minimum.

Monthly workmen's compensation payments were increased to \$260 effective July 1st, and the earnings ceiling raised to \$12,000 per year.

A higher general minimum wage rate of \$2.25 an hour came into effect on October 1st, with a minimum for construction industry employees of \$2.50 an hour. A further increase is scheduled for May 1st, 1975.

As part of a resolve to meet the need for housing for the growing population in this Province, my Government has sought and encouraged greater involvement by the private sector in a broad range of programs. Announcement, last fall, of the first agreements with 11 developers for a potential total of 12,400 housing units to 1976 under the Housing Action Program, is one illustration of the progress being made. Some 30 additional developer agreements are being negotiated.

One-third of the 3,000 units scheduled to start in several municipalities by the end of 1974 are within the income range of the Provincial Home Ownership Made Easy Program, as are a further 636 units which will be started by the end of March. By a provision of the Budget last spring, the Province will make unconditional grants to area municipalities to ensure that local taxes will not be increased to service new developments of this kind.

Further, my Government has taken steps to help stem the rapid climb in prices on the housing market which has taken place alongside a somewhat slower rate of increase in the supply of land. A new tax levied on land speculators has been aimed directly at discouraging speculation activities and a realization of windfall profits by anyone in Ontario, while providing specified exemptions with respect to personal residences and recreational property, tourist establishments, commercial and industrial property, and farm and Crown lands.

At the same time, a Land Transfer Tax has been introduced, designed to discourage non-residents from purchasing and holding land, but allowing for exemptions in cases where the purchase is considered to be of sufficient economic benefit to Ontario.

Plans to improve escential services for people in remote areas of Ontario are progressing. An air communications network for Northwestern Ontario is scheduled for full service in 1977 with NorOntair links between 12 isolated communities and national and regional air services at Dryden, Thunder Bay and Sault Ste. Marie. My Government's authorization to the Ontario Northland Transportation Commission to implement NorOntair Northwest follows the success of a comparable demonstration program in Northeastern Ontario over the past three years.

On May 31st, 1974, a second subsidiary compact to the 10-year General Development Agreement with the Government of Canada was signed for Northwestern Ontario. Honourable Members will recall that a first subsidiary agreement was reached in February for several development projects in the Cornwall area. The Northwestern Ontario agreement is for seven specific projects including sewage and road construction and town-site infrastructure assistance at a cost of \$42 million over a three-year period.

Subsequently, my Government also announced plans to increase the Province's regional priority budget for Northwestern Ontario to meet needs beyond those served by regular Ministry programs. Funds have been increased from \$2.4 million in 1973-74 to \$9.3 million for 28 projects in the current fiscal year. This assistance, while continuing to place emphasis on building a sound economic base in various parts of the region, has widened the scope of the program to include social and cultural initiatives, as well as a new project to train native people in policing and probationary services.

The special program to obtain health practitioners for remote or underserviced areas of the province placed its 200th physician last summer, and 60 dentists have so far been recruited.

In December, a new rotation scheme was launched, under a one-year agreement with the Ontario College of Family Physicians, to serve communities that are unable to attract permanent resident physicians. More than 80 doctors

have indicated their willingness to take part in the program in rotation periods of a minimum of two weeks each. The experience at Armstrong, the first locality to receive this novel service, will provide a base for evaluation and possible expansion of the program to other remote northern communities.

A unique new course was offered during the 1974 summer to train native Indian people as school teachers. Since then, most of the 96 successful candidates have been teaching or otherwise assisting in the education of native students. The project is the result of close co-operation between native peoples' organizations, the Government of Canada and the Ontario Ministry of Education. The second phase of the training program will be given next summer.

A plan has been developed to promote the use of Ontario's 5,000 elementary and secondary schools as focal centres of the communities they serve. The Province's school boards are being offered administrative and financial support for community school projects. In addition, my Government has strongly endorsed full community use of school facilities after regular school hours by groups and agencies working in concert with their local boards of education.

Education celings announced for 1975 will allow a 13 per cent increase in school board expenditures, amounting to an additional \$350 million over the current year. An added new form of assistance provides a Provincial allowance of \$80 per elementary pupil to enrich the programs offered at this fundamental stage of the educational experience.

At the post-secondary level, Provincial support to colleges and universities will be increased from \$659 million in the current year to \$768 million for the next academic year, an average increase of 16 per cent.

A new advisory council on Franco-Ontarian affairs has been established to assist the Government in matters affecting French-speaking university and college students, including manpower training and cultural affairs.

Cultural and recreational activities play an important part in sustaining the well-being of all our citizens and the life of the community. In support of this belief, my Government recently created a new Ministry of Culture and Recreation, which will give greater recognition to the multi-cultural nature of our society. It will be the task of the new Ministry to ensure the preservation and enhancement of Ontario's cultural heritage and to stimulate creative excellence on the part of individuals, as well ss for the benefit of the community as a whole.

A new Consumer Reporting Act proclaimed on July 2nd protects consumers in credit and personal information reporting, granting them the right to know what is reported and to whom. The law also makes provision for correction of false information.

Complementary legislation in the form of a Business Practices Act establishes sanctions against a range of undesirable practices that may occur in consumer sales.

Maintaining a secure and adequate supply of electrical power is of crucial importance to industrial as well as home consumers across Ontario. My Government has given approval to several power development projects by Ontario

Hydro for 1977 to 1982. They include construction of a new generating station at Wesleyville, expansion of the Pickering generation station, and construction of two additional heavy water plants in the Bruce nuclear power project.

Following an extensive and successful public consultation process, the raoute of a 500 kilovolt transmission line from Nanticoke to Pickering has been determined, and the Government has given approval for its construction at an estimated cost of \$360 million.

Significant advances have been made toward overcoming the problems posed by growing volumes of solid waste and for recovering useful materials presently lost in landfill operations.

Last spring, my Government announced plans to proceed in a joint undertaking with the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto in what is known as the "Watts from Waste" project. The goal of this experiment, to be carried out at the Lakeview generating station, is to use processed solid waste as fuel in the production of electrical power.

In the fall, my Government took the initiative in launching a comprehensive province-wide program to reclaim and recycle useful resources from solid waste, with the ultimate aim of replacing garbage disposal with a reclamation system serving 90 per cent of the population. Initially, six reclamation and recycling plants are to be built at a cost of \$17 million for the Kingston, Sudbury, London, Metropolitan Toronto and Halton-Peel areas.

Growing world-wide concerns about ensuring adequate production and efficient distribution of food make it incumbent on governments to encourage the preservation and use of arable lands for agricultural production. To this end, a new Food Land Development Branch has been created in the Ministry of Agriculture and Food. Among its responsibilities, the Branch will help develop programs to maintain and encourage food production, in the interim, on Government-owned lands which are suitable for the purpose, although intended for other uses in the future.

In the spring, extensive damage was caused in Kitchener, Cambridge, Brantford, Paris and neighbouring communities when the Grand River overflowed its banks. The work of the local Disaster Relief Committee in the areas affected was carried out with tremendous will and spirit. Relief made available by the Province offered up to \$4 in financial assistance for every \$1 of locally raised funds, a more generous measure than in similar previous disasters, as serious losses were experienced by property owners unable to secure flood insurance.

Ontario was host to the 15th annual Premiers' Conference in September, at which Canada's Provincial leaders reaffirmed a commitment to continued interprovincial co-operation in the development of economic policies. The emphasis is on the formulation of effective measures over the shorter term, while maintaining a broad perspective of sound long-term planning.

Overall, Ontario's economy experienced a real growth of almost four per cent in 1974. While lower than the near-record rate of approximately seven per cent achieved in 1973, this means that the Province was nevertheless able to maintain the momentum of economic growth at a very satisfactory level.

At the close of what has been, as evidenced in this review, an active and productive Session of this Assembly, may I, on behalf of the people of Ontario, commend its Members on their many accomplishments.

And now, I declare the Session prorogued.
